#### **Program Notes**

We welcome back Lil' Rev, from Milwaukee, since his exuberant appearance here in 2007 presenting old-time music, stories and poetry, as well as definitive work on the ukulele and the blues harmonica. It was like a whole vaudeville show from a single chair. Much of his repertoire and inspiration comes from the American musical mosaic of the 1920s and 30s, when multiethnic sounds from immigrants early and late joined those of early American settlers and African Americans in their first forays on vinyl and the airwaves.

The play list of their latest CD indicates that Cathy Barton and Dave Para have held to their dedication to the song and tune traditions of Missouri and the Ozarks. Dance music pervades their instrumental work on hammered dulcimer, banjo and guitar while their duet singing embraces the old songs as well as new ones that amplify the echoes of early song themes and structures. This evening they are joined by fiddler Paul Grace and pianist Pete Szkolka.

A duet performance can allow for a great deal of nuance in both vocal and instrumental statements, and harmony and dynamics have more freedom of movement than in larger ensembles. Kate Power and Steve Einhorn, of Portland, Ore., employ as many of these elements as possible to let their music flow with the ease of second nature, while their original songs show a fine sense of wit and a great sense of place. The blues may be a craft and it may be an art, but it is first a feeling, and Rory Block has reached for the power of that feeling in every facet of her memorable performances. Her intensity of focus is evident in the technical wizardry in singing and guitar playing. It appears that rather than absorbing a style and tradition to see what one can do with it creatively, Rory has given herself totally to the music to see what it can create within her.

Missouri is a great meeting place, geologically, geographically and culturally, so what better locale for **Swing De Ville** to join the twin fiddling style of Bob Wills' Texas Playboys to meet the gypsy jazz of Django Reinhart and the Hot Club of Paris. The two styles share a sense of joy. Swing has been riding with square dance tempo in Missouri fiddling for decades. The band features **Justin Branum** and **Matt Wyatt** on fiddle, **Gary Hunt** and **Clint Hasse** on guitar and vocals, and **Glenn Meyers** on bass.

"The Wandering Fool," is the title cut of the 2008 Bob Dyer tribute album. Performed by **David Lynn Grimes**, it's a pretty good title for the minstrel himself. A natural storyteller, a teller of nature if there ever was one, his life's journey has flung him to the far corners. His songs speak from the steps that journey and the earth on which he steps while his musical settings draw far and near from his wanderings in Celtic, bassa nova and hillbilly.

The iconic steamboat era reaches back musically from Stephen Foster on the banjo and through emergence of the blues, ragtime, and early jazz styles. Their more than 25 years on the bandstands of the Delta Queen and Mississippi Queen Jazzou Jones and Bob Schad have performed the classics of these sounds. Bob's career began during the great folk scare of the 1960s, while Jazzou (Tom) discovered the infectious ragtime style during his piano studies. Wherever you find their names, they're usually preceded by the word, "Showtime." Long before "O, Brother," before "Deliverance" and "Bonnie and Clyde," something in traditional Appalachian music caught the ears and imaginations of young American folksingers. In North Carolina, Jim Watson and the late Tommy Thompson joined fiddler Alan Jabbour to form the Hollow Rock String Band, and later the Red Clay Ramblers with Mike Craver and **Bill Hicks**. These bands subsequently inspired players all over the U.S. As these friends have regrouped recently
